CHM 144/1440 General Chemistry I (4)

States of matter, atomic structure, bonding and molecular structure, chemical reactions.

Recommended preparation is three years high school mathematics and one year of high school chemistry. (CHM 144 or CHM 1440) and (CHM 147 or CHM 1470) replace lecture/lab. (CHM

144 or CHM 1440) and (CHM 147 or CHM 1470) together satisfy the university general education requirement in the natural science and technology knowledge exploration area. (Formerly CHM 144) Prerequisite(s): Prerequisite(s): Score of ~~20~~ 22 or higher on ACT mathematics exam *or 1020 or higher on SAT mathematics exam*; or (MTH 062 or MTH 0662) or equivalent, *or placement above MTH 0662*. Corequisite(s): (CHM 147 or CHM 1470)

4. Committee approved the request from the Department of English to **withdraw** the request to change to *prerequisites* of the following course:

ENG 387 Screenwriting (4)

Prerequisites: (ENG 217 or CW 2400) and (CIN 150 or CIN 1150) or (ENG 250 or ENG 2610); *or (CIN 165 or CIN 1600)*.

5. Committee deferred the request from the Department of Music, Theatre and Dance to **change** the *description* and *prerequisites* for the following course:

MUT 415/MUA 1080, 2080, 3080, 4080 Composition (2)

Private lessons in composition and composition laboratory: studies, exercises and projects concerning creativity and craft in composing music. May be repeated for additional credit.

Prerequisites: ~~Composition majors: MUT 114, 115 with average grade of 3.5 or higher. Non-composition majors: MUT 114, 260, 261 with average grade of 3.50 or higher. 6. Committee approved the request from the Department of Music, Theatre and Dance to **withdraw** the following *new course proposals*:

THA 2024 Designer Computer Skills (4)

Introduces students to graphics and computer drafting software that has become the industry standard for work in the performing arts. Students will learn to create architectural draftings, lighting pilots and presentational renderings using Vectorworks and Photoshop. The course will also introduce common programs such as AutoCAD, Sketch-Up and Illustrator.

Prerequisites: (THA 124 or THA 1024).

THA 3015 Acting for the Camera I (4)

Introduction to the fundamentals of acting for the camera including techniques for television, film, and commercials. Also covers the business aspects of these media. May be repeated once for credit.

Prerequisites: (THA 310 or THA 3010).

THA 4015 Acting for the Camera II (2)

Continuation of THA 3015, including a deeper explanation of techniques for television, film and commercials and the business of these media.

Prerequisites: THA 3015.

7. Committee approved the request from the Department of Philosophy to **add** the following *new course*:

PHL 3630 Philosophy of Crime, Policing and Punishment (4)

Philosophical engagement with issues raised by practices of policing and incarceration. Critical evaluation of the role of the courts, police, and prison systems in our society. Consideration of the social implications of criminalization, policing, and incarceration. Prerequisites: (PHL 101 or PHL 1100) or (PHL 103 or PHL 1300) or (PHL 200 or PHL 2100) or (CRJ 100 or CRJ 1100).

8. Committee approved the request from the Department of Sociology, Anthropology, Social Work and Criminal Justice to **withdraw** the following *new course proposals*:

SW 3412 Global Health and Social Development (4)

Global health issues and their relationship to economic and social development. Major infectious and non-communicable diseases in the context of the social determinants of health. Includes an optional study abroad component at end of semester.

Prerequisite: Formal admission to the social work program or instructor permission.

CRJ 310 Drugs, Culture and Popular Music (4)

Criminological analysis of alcohol and drug references in popular music, and to variations in public perceptions of those references according to era, genre of music, and race/class/gender of the artist. Beginning with 1920's southern folk music, the course moves in chronological order toward the present day and considers a wide variety of genres.

Prerequisites: CRJ 100, CRJ 300 and a minimum grade of 2.5.

~~Prerequisites: WRT 160 or WRT 1060 and WRT 232 or WRT 2070 or permission of instructor.~~

Gerontology Concentration

The gerontology concentration is a multidisciplinary approach designed to provide students with in-depth knowledge about the aging process and the skills needed to work with older adult as well as understand the psychological, social, economic and health/medical issues that older adults face. Students will be prepared for direct service roles with seniors and their caregivers in nursing homes, geriatric health and mental health centers, hospice, hospitals and long-term-care facilities, multipurpose senior centers, senior citizen social services, and retirement communities.
