



TABLE TOPICS WITH YOUR STUDENT

Your student is about to begin an exciting and fulfilling journey with new experiences, challenges and victories. We encourage families to sit down with one another to prepare for the adventure that lies ahead and discuss the following topics.

- Create a “stay-in-touch” plan that outlines how often you will communicate and in what way.
- Discuss expectations about what and how information will be shared concerning grades and course schedules. Determine if your student will designate you as a proxy in MySAIL.
- Discuss with your student their plan to pay for their college education and any related expenses. Determine if your student will authorize you or another family member as an authorized user in eBill.
- Connect with your student about their academic plans by asking how the courses they registered for fit into their degree plan.
- Ask your student how they plan to get connected in their first semester, and which extra-curricular activities they find interesting.
- Help your student understand the importance of priorities and creating a plan for balancing time between school, work, social and family obligations.
- Empower your student to focus on their overall well-being including creating a fitness plan, establishing healthy eating habits, making doctors’ appointments and building a budget.
- Identify ways you can support your student in achieving their goals; we’re all in this together!

ORIENTATION AND NEW STUDENT PROGRAMS

NEW STUDENT ORIENTATION

New Student Orientation is a student’s formal introduction to university life. This free comprehensive program is purposefully designed to make your son’s or daughter’s transition to OU more comfortable and enjoyable. All new students are required to attend a two-part orientation.

PART ONE

Part One is held during the summer months from 8:30 a.m. to 4:30 p.m. Students are encouraged to select the earliest orientation date their schedule allows.

During Part One, your student will:

- Be introduced to their school/college
- Meet with their assigned FYAC academic adviser and register for classes
- Learn about university policies, resources and OU accounts
- Participate in a campus tour
- Meet other new students and have fun!

Please note: students are not eligible to register for classes until they attend Part One.

PART TWO

During Part Two, students will participate in events with faculty, staff and student leaders, including academic open houses, New Student Convocation and Involvement Fair. Part Two will be held on Tuesday, September 5, 2017.

PARENT ORIENTATION

Parent Orientation is a free program designed to provide you with information on university resources and support services so that you can help your student make a successful transition to university life.

THE PROGRAM

Parent Orientation is held on the same days as Part One of New Student Orientation; however, they are separate programs. While your student attends his or her orientation program, you will participate in parent-specific sessions which address your questions and concerns. The program covers the following topics:

- Transitioning from high school to college
- Academic programs, support services and advising
- Student Financial Services
- Residence hall and commuter services
- Campus involvement

At the end of New Student Orientation, join your student at the Golden Grizzly Celebration. Enjoy a sweet treat and meet with representatives from campus offices and student organizations from 4 to 4:30 p.m.

ACADEMIC OPPORTUNITIES

COLLEGIATE COMMUNICATION (COM 1100)

Collegiate Communication (COM 1100) is a graded, one-credit course designed to help students have a successful start at OU. Research shows that students who enroll in COM 1100 during their first semester are more likely to be successful in their first year. Students will learn communications skills that will enhance academic, personal and social success in college.

COLLEGE SUCCESS SEMINAR

Encourage your student to attend the College Success Seminar, held on August 9, to learn how to smoothly transition from high school to college, develop time management techniques, explore majors and careers, and improve essential study skills — all before the start of the academic year.

UNIVERSITY HOUSING

Oakland University Housing creates a warm and supportive environment where academics and residential life work together to cultivate learning, personal well-being and social experiences that enhance student life on campus. Staff and programs create a balanced environment in which the learning process, interpersonal communication and the understanding of cultural and lifestyle differences are valued and encouraged.

University Housing provides holistic support to students throughout their entire stay on campus. Highly trained staff members, chosen for their demonstrated ability to work with students, live among the students and provide 24-hour a day emotional and social support, while also creating engaging and dynamic social opportunities. The Student Success Assistant and a staff of student academic peer mentors work in partnership with the FYAC and Tutoring Center to improve students’ academic success and provide information on tutoring, supplemental instruction, study skills, and various academic programs and workshops. Technology assistance is also provided to all residential students.

Students who live on campus have the opportunity to join one of our living-learning communities, including:

- Pre-Nursing

FIRST-YEAR ADVISING

THE FIRST YEAR ADVISING CENTER IS HERE TO HELP YOUR STUDENT IN THE FOLLOWING WAYS:

ACADEMIC ADVISING

All incoming freshmen are assigned an academic adviser who helps them explore majors, connects them to campus opportunities and provides support in achieving academic goals. First-year students are required to meet with their assigned academic adviser three times a year and are encouraged to be prepared for the appointment by bringing ideas, concerns and questions. Their first appointment will be at New Student Orientation, and the remaining two appointments are during the academic year — one in the fall semester and one in the winter semester.

KEEPING YOUR STUDENT ON TRACK

The 28 campaign is designed to keep your student on track toward graduation. The events and resources offered as a part of this campaign will help your student to achieve sophomore status (28 credits) by the end of his or her first year.

MAJOR EXPLORATION/CAREER COUNSELING FOR UNDECIDED/RE-DECIDING STUDENTS

Whether your student is in their first year or beyond, the FYAC will help them identify major and career options. Selecting a major and/or career is no easy task. In fact, over one third of OU graduates changed their major at least once. Through appointments with their assigned adviser, students will explore their interests, personality, skills and values to help make a decision that is the right fit for them. While there is no specific time limit for selecting a major, your student will meet with his or her adviser regularly to invest the proper time and effort into making an appropriate selection.

PAYMENT DUE DATE

Payment due date for the fall semester is August 15. The deadline to satisfy all enrollment and financial aid requirements and provide third party sponsor authorization or scholarship checks is at least 14 days before the payment due date.

Students with an account balance not paid in full by August 15 will be canceled from all courses and university housing (if applicable).
