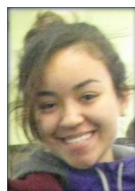

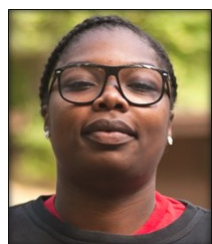

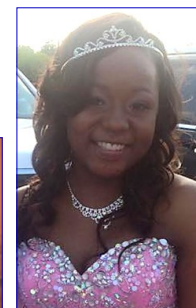

COE POLICY SEMINAR

This year the PUB Parent Association was represented at the COE Policy Seminar by Natasha Harmon and Marjorie Dempsey. After a day of informational and strategy workshops, on Tuesday, March 17, they joined TRIO advocates from all over the nation to share with members of Congress why TRIO Programs are so essential to achieving U.S. education, economic, and quality of life goals. Here are reflections from Ms. Harmon, parent of graduating seniors LaTisha and NiNesha Baker:

I truly enjoyed my experience at the **Council for Opportunity in Education 35th Annual Policy Seminar**. This was my first trip to Washington, DC; and being a part of the Policy Seminar was truly a blessing. It really gave me better insight into why TRIO programs are so important to our children and why Congress should continue to support and fund these programs.

When my group went to Capitol Hill, **we had the privilege to meet with our senator The Honorable Debbie Stabenow**, as well as representatives John Conyers and Mike Bishop. STUDENT AFFAIRS ASSESSMENT HIGHLIGHTS

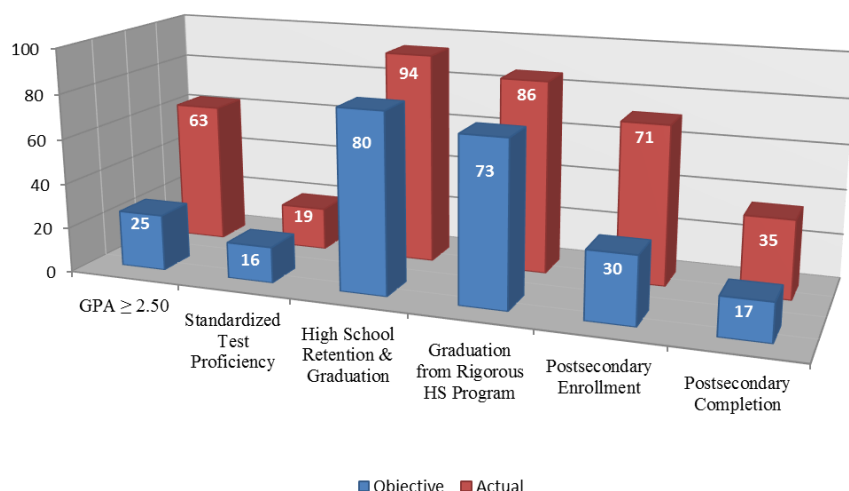
The Student Affairs Assessment Team is proud to present our monthly installment “Assessment Highlights” featuring individual department’s assessment initiatives. Watch for monthly highlights in your email!

In 1964, federal legislation (Higher Education Opportunity Act) established TRIO Programs—initially 3 and now 7 serving both youth and adult populations (including veterans) from middle to graduate school. **TRIO’s goal is to make higher education accessible and attainable for low-income, first-generation, and disabled learners** through a set of national intervention programs. OU’s Project Upward Bound (PUB) College Prep Academy is a TRIO Program funded at OU since 1966 through successful competitive grant applications.

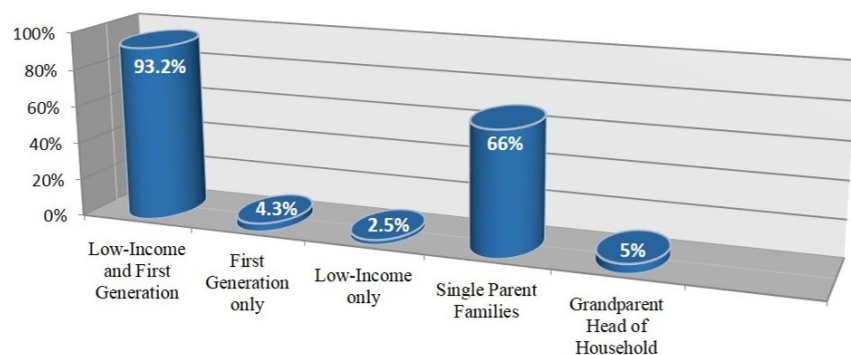
Operating on a 5-year grant cycle, PUB serves youth in the Pontiac, Oak Park, and Pontiac Academy for Excellence School Districts. However, **each subsequent Program Year’s funds are released only if the Project documents, in its Annual Performance Report to the U. S. Department of Education, significant progress toward achieving its objectives.** Therefore, **ongoing assessment is pivotal to the existence of PUB.**

Project Upward Bound establishes high expectations of its Scholars, then provides the resources they need to achieve them. **The chart below documents that, for 2013-2014, this strategy yielded performance that exceeded expected outcomes for each of the 6 objectives defined in the approved grant application.**

The 2013-14 progress was made in spite of the fact that 52% of enrollees were at higher risk of academic failure due to GPA’s of 2.50 or below at admission and that 100% of them came from schools on the U.S. Secretary of Education’s Persistently Low-Achieving Schools list.

Impact

By breaking the cycle of the absence of postsecondary education in low-income/first-generation households, **PUB is ultimately contributing to increasing the educational attainment levels in its target communities of Pontiac and Royal Oak Township.** By serving a single individual in a family, PUB has influenced siblings as well as parents to seek out and obtain higher education.

The 2013-2014 outcomes document the efficacy of PUB’s current strategic plan. The plan results from years of assessment and evaluation that led to PUB adopting several strategies that continue to contribute significantly to its documented success:

- Iowa Test of Educational Development
- Student Success Planning
- Trip Incentive System
- College & Senior Seminars
- Leadership Development Institute (includes golf & archery)
- Kahn Academy (self-paced learning)

These improvements 1) **empower Scholars with feedback** that they can use to achieve their goals and 2) **catapult PUB toward even greater success!** As a result, **PUB is impacting lives, changing families, and improving communities!**

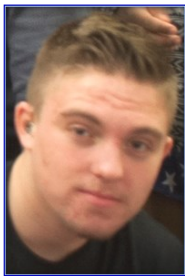
Dear Future Attendees,

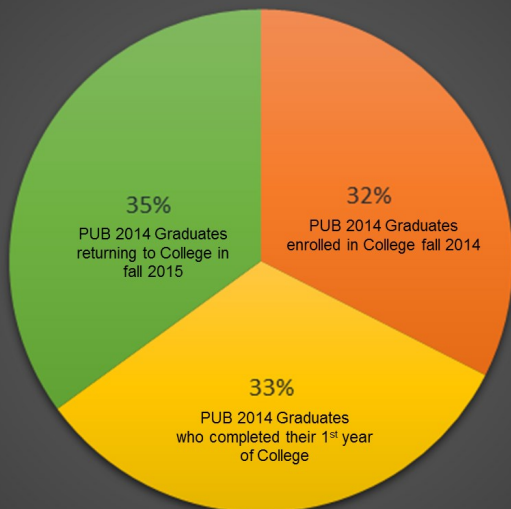
Recruitment:

Project Upward Bound 2014 Graduates

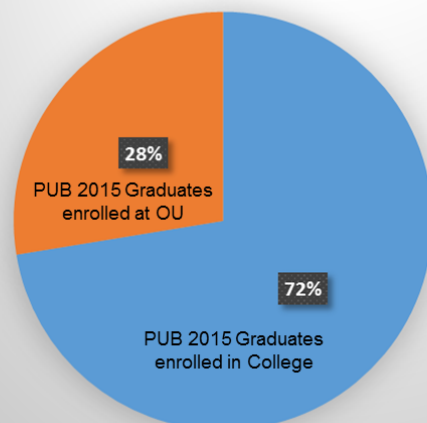


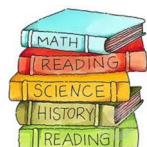
In 2014 PUB had a total of 18 Graduating Seniors, 13 of whom reported enrollment in the college of their choice. One matriculated to Oakland University and the others went to various Michigan Universities. All of the 13 have reported that they will be returning to the same college in fall 2015; and one graduate will be starting Oakland Community College this fall for the first time. This is why the graph shows a 2% increase in the fall.

Another school year has come and gone. As we wish a fond farewell to our graduating Scholars, and welcome PUB Scholars just starting their journey, let's take a look back at the academic year of 2014-15.

Under the guidance of College Club Supervisor Ms. Billy, and Lead Tutor Mr. Samarth, College Club began in September with a new crew of tutors that were eager to guide our scholars to success. Scholar and Tutor logs al-

lowed for documentation of what scholars were working on and I was able to share that information with teachers who called to check on scholars. A Study Skills workshop was introduced at the beginning of each session to highlight some of the skills that do not always get taught in the classroom. While there are still a few details to be clarified for next year, College Club is certainly on the right track.

Saturday Academy started a bit later than usual because of when Homecoming was scheduled at the various schools, but we certainly hit the ground running. New this year were ID tags with each scholar's schedule on the back. Many scholars reported that this helped a lot with knowing where to go for their classes, and teachers reported that it was easier to put faces with names in their classrooms. The focus of Saturday Academy for scholars in grades 9 and 10 turned from ACT prep to getting ready for the new SAT. Because of all of the testing changes (MStep and SAT) I hope to see increased Saturday Academy attendance next year.

Khan Academy was a new piece added to the academic program for 2014-2015. There was not the participation hoped for, however, those who did participate in Khan Academy had significant improvements over those who did not. The cut point for determining groups was 45 minutes of work. Scholars with less than 45 minutes did very little, if any work in the program. Some signed in and never returned.

On May 16, 72 scholars came in for the Spring ITED. There were 31 freshmen, 23 sophomores, 12 juniors and 6 seniors. Forty-six scholars saw improvement in their composite score (23 were freshmen!). Overall, these scholars gained a total of 20.96 years of knowledge in the last year. That's wonderful! Let's keep that momentum going. ITED report cards have been updated and are available in the PUB office.
