3. Committee approved the request from the Department of Art and Art History to **add** the following *new course*:

DES 395 Package Design (4)

In-depth look at the design, production, evaluation, and analysis of various types of packaging. Creative solutions for package design, three-dimensional mock-ups and models, material restrictions and limitations. Prerequisite: DES 350 with a grade of 2.8 or higher.

CRJ 360 Criminal Careers and Career Criminals (4)

Prerequisite(s): ~~CRJ 100 and~~ CRJ 200, *each with a grade of 2.5 or higher.*

CRJ 490 Capstone: Criminal Justice Policy Analysis (4)

Prerequisite(s): CRJ 200 and CRJ 430, *each with a grade of 2.5 or higher.*

13. Committee approved the request from the Department of Sociology, Anthropology, Social Work and Criminal Justice to **change** the *description and prerequisites* of the following courses:

CRJ 430 Internship in Criminal Justice (4)

Field placement and supervision of students in an approved criminal justice agency requiring the completion of associated course work to receive academic credit. Prerequisite: all required and core classes for the major and approval of director of field placement. Satisfies the university general education requirement for a writing intensive course in the major. Prerequisite for writing intensive: completion of the university writing foundation requirement *and a minimum grade of 2.5.*

Prerequisite(s): CRJ 100 *with a grade of 2.5 or higher.*

14. Committee deferred the request from the Department of Sociology, Anthropology, Social Work and Criminal Justice to **add** the following *new courses*:

CRJ 349 Introduction to Intelligence (4)

Introduces students to the basic elements of intelligence: collection, analysis, dissemination, counterintelligence, and covert methods.

Prerequisite(s): CRJ 100 with minimum grade of 2.5 for criminal justice majors.

CRJ 350 Introduction to Security (4)

Focuses on the basic principles and concepts used by security professionals.

Prerequisite(s): CRJ 100 with minimum grade of 2.5 for criminal justice majors.

CRJ 351 Geography of Crime (4)

Examines the structural and social determinants of crime across geographic places and considers the spatial distribution of crime and victimization.

Prerequisite(s): CRJ 100 with+ minimum grade of 2.5.

To earn a Bachelor of Arts with a major in criminal justice, ~~and a specialization in either law enforcement, courts, corrections/treatment or juvenile justice~~, students must complete a minimum of 48 credits as listed below. *Students must earn a minimum grade of 2.5 in the following major courses: CRJ 100, CRJ 200, SOC 202, all CRJ CORE courses, all CRJ elective courses, CRJ 430 and CRJ 490.*

Field experience is an integral part of the criminal justice curriculum. Students must have an overall GPA of 2.0 and a GPA of 2.5 in the major, completed all required and core courses, and met with the field adviser to secure an internship placement prior to enrolling in CRJ 430.
