

What is an institutional culture?

A post-secondary institution's culture consists of its embedded patterns, behaviours, shared values, beliefs, and ideologies, as well as numerous microcultures.

A culture that values teaching has:

- A shared campus commitment to teaching
- Meaningful and constructive evaluation of teaching
- Broad engagement (students, faculty, stakeholders)
- Hiring and promotion practices related to teaching
- Infrastructure
- Support for teacher development
- Teachers who use good practices
- Recognition of good teaching
- Opportunities to develop teaching leadership
- Institutional policies to foster quality teaching
- Regular assessment of impact for improvement

- Teacher accessibility
- Teaching evaluation
- Implementing student feedback
- Support for teaching
- Recognition of teaching

Faculty

- Support for teaching
- Recognition of teaching
- Infrastructure
- Research not above teaching
- Teaching evaluations





- Fair and effective practices in teaching evaluation
- Ethical use of teaching evaluation data
- Policies and procedures in effective teaching evaluation

Educational Leadership

- Building or enhancing networks
- Supporting change and innovation
- Leading cross-disciplinary development efforts

Teaching Methods

- Effective teaching and assessment strategies
- New teaching and learning approaches, methodologies, or technologies
- Strategic course, curriculum, and/or program development and refinement

Conference Proposal Review Process

- Proposal submission deadline: February 17, 2017
- Blind review by two peers
- Program committee to review results
- Results communicated by the end of March, 2017 (revisions as needed)
- Final schedule will be available in April, 2017

Proposal Criteria and Concurrent Session Tips

- 1. Clear and valuable goals
- 2. Elements of engagement
- 3. Relevant literature
- 4. Relevance to the conference theme and audience
- 5. Meaningful content
