Our graduate programs provide students with the knowledge, skills, and experiences necessary to become successful consumers and producers of psychological science. Psychology is a broad discipline that interfaces with the biological and social sciences and our program is organized around five concentrations that demonstrate the breadth of psychological science: (1) Evolutionary and Comparative Psychology; (2) Social-Personality Psychology; (3) Behavioral Health Psychology; (4) Developmental Psychology; and (5) Cognition, Perception, and Neuroscience. Students seeking either the MS degree or the Ph.D. will select one of these concentration areas. The MS degree is intended to help students achieve either of two goals: (1) successful admission into and completion of a Ph.D. program in psychology or (2) acquisition of the advanced research skills and knowledge of psychological science necessary for successful participation and advancement in an array of career paths across multiple market sectors. The Ph.D. degree is intended to prepare students for a position in academia in which they will conduct and publish original research in addition to teaching and training the next generation of students.

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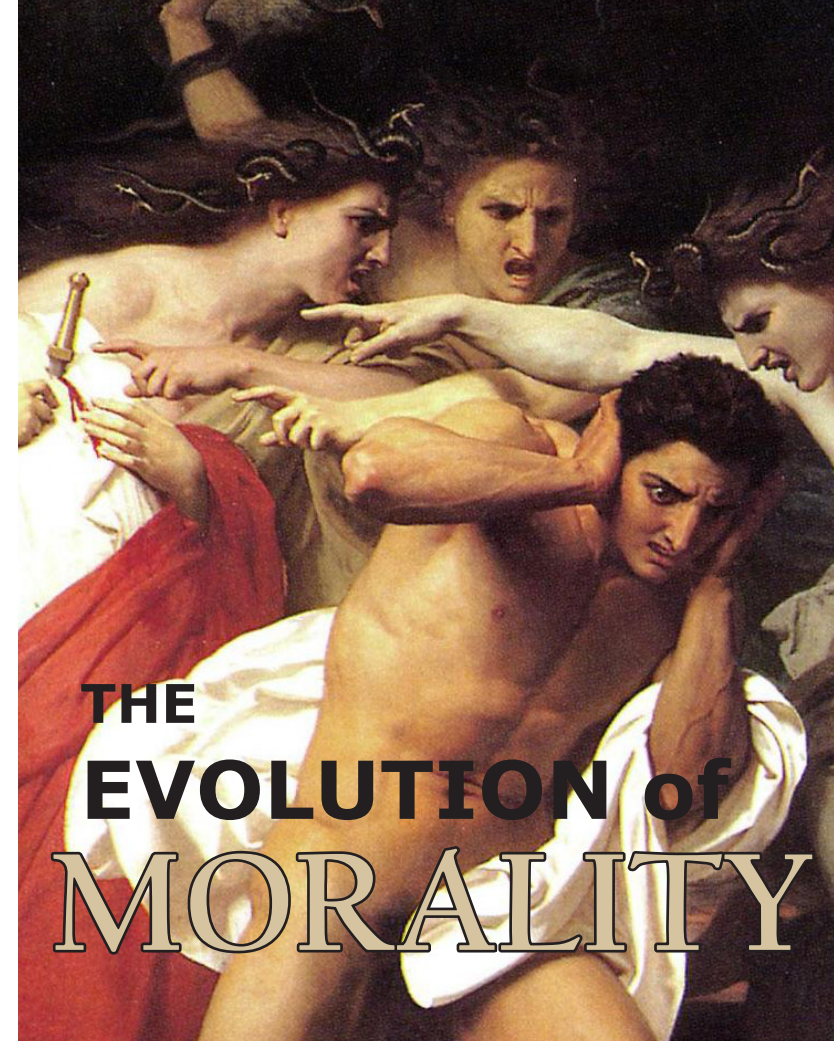
